

FROM THE ROADMASTER

CHIP AND FOG SEAL

Over the summer, several of the **Township roadways** received **preventative maintenance** in the form of "**chip and fog seal**". Using both of these processes **together** was only **recently granted approval** by **PennDOT**. This **preventative maintenance process** will continue yearly as a means of buying longer life for the **Township** roadways. Which roadways will be done each year is a **decision** to be made by the **Board of Supervisors**. This is a **cost effective** way of keeping our roadways in good condition **without** the **high cost** of repaving. The inconvenience is short term; present during the application of the product. **Advance notice** will be given to the residents in the areas of the **Township** that will be impacted. **Liquid fuel monies** are used to **help defray** the costs associated with this maintenance. Although the cost of asphalt products continues to climb, the amount of liquid fuel monies

POTATO VALLEY ROAD BRIDGE

received does not comparatively increase.

The contract to replace the Potato Valley Road Bridge has been awarded to Deblin, Inc.. The anticipated Notice to Proceed is scheduled for October 7, 2019. With this project, residents should expect road closures and traffic delays. Temporary inconveniences for the benefit of permanent improvement. Residents are asked to make the necessary travel and schedule adjustments and abide by all the posted speed limits. The completion date is tentatively scheduled for June 30, 2020. Watch for updates on our Facebook page or on our website. A notice will be sent to those directly affected by the bridge closing when an approximate date is finalized. Thank you for your anticipated cooperation!

SNOW EMERGENCY DECLARATIONS

Township Ordinance 2016-05 addresses parking regulations, placing matter onto roadways, sidewalk maintenance, clearing of hydrants, and penalties for violations when a Snow Emergency Declaration is put into place. A Township road assessment will be performed making note of all properties that have items in the Township right-of-way. Letters will be sent requesting that these items be removed; cars to basketball hoops. This action is to ensure the safety of our road crew and to keep our equipment free of damage. You may be liable for any damage that is incurred by municipal personnel or property damage due to violations. Remember it is also unlawful to blow or plow snow onto roadways. Our road crew works day and night to keep our roadways safe and passable 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We can all do our part to keep them safe and their equipment in working order.

FROM THE DESK OF THE BUILDING CODES & ZONING OFFICER

Being informed and in compliance is far better than being in violation.

Most building projects require a permit. Whether you are building a shed or having one delivered, putting in a retaining wall, adding a deck or a fence, building a permanent mailbox or a chicken coop, putting on an addition or adding solar panels, a permit is required. Permits and approvals are also



required when starting or changing a business. Not all businesses are permitted in every Zoning district in the Township. Starting a project without a required permit will result in additional costs.



Please call the **Zoning Officer** to schedule an appointment. **Appointments are** required so that the Zoning Officer can allot the proper amount of time to answer your questions and explain the process and requirements, without interruption. Walk-ins cannot always be accommodated. The Zoning Officer is in the office Monday and Thursday and can be reached at (717) 921-8128, Ext. 107.

CODES ENFORCEMENT AND COMPLIANCE



The Township's Codes Official is tasked with enforcing Township ordinances and addressing **complaints** and **violations**. The **process for filing** a complaint is as follows:

- A **complaint form** must be completed, signed and submitted to the Township office. Complaint forms are available at the Township office or on our website, www.middlepaxtontwp.org. Anonymous or verbal complaints will not be addressed.
- The Codes Official will review all filed complaints and determine next steps. A letter is often times sent to the property owner detailing the concern along with a copy of the applicable ordinance. Names of complainants are kept confidential.
- If the **situation persists**, a **Notice of Violation** may be issued and possible fines imposed.
- If the issue remains unresolved, the Township may file a civil complaint with the Magisterial District Justice. At this time, the complainant may be asked to testify.

Please **contact** the Township office if you have questions or concerns; **(717) 921-8128, Ext.108**. If your concern is urgent, please ask to speak to the Township Manager.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND DAUPHIN-MIDDLE PAXTON FIRE COMPANY #1





With the coming of Fall also brings our annual Open House and Chicken BBQ. The date is set for SEPTEMBER 28TH, beginning at 10:00AM until 4:00PM. BUT the Chicken BBQ will only last if the chicken lasts. So, come early, come hungry!!! The Chicken BBQ is one of our main fundraisers we

hold each year. Your support at these activities is greatly appreciated.

The **Open House** is a yearly event featuring the services the fire company provides to the community. You can see what **equipment** we have on the apparatus, **talk** to our **members**, **tour** the **firehouse**, and **ride** on the **fire engine**. The **Open House** is also **open** to **community organizations**, **Boy Scouts** and **Girl Scouts**, the **Heritage Group**, and **LifeTeam**, your ambulance provider. These are a few of the groups. **Come out and talk to them**. Know what's going on.

Do you know what to do in case of a fire? Is your home/business equipped with **Smoke** and **Carbon Monoxide** (**CO2**) **detectors**? Need **information** or **help** with these devices, **contact the Fire Company**. We provide **Fire Safety Programs** for groups of all ages. In **October** we will be **visiting** a local **childcare facility** and spending the day at **Middle Paxton Elementary School**.



Dauphin Middle Paxton Fire Company responded to approximately 400 calls for assistance last year. Members spend a minimum of 200 hours in-house training and many more hours attending other fire trainings offered by HACC or other mutual aide fire companies. During the year, you may see fire apparatus just out riding through your neighborhood. We train our driver/operators by driving our streets for familiarization of area and at times will have them stop and connect to a hydrant near you. Since we are a rural fire company, our operators must learn to draft and siphon water from streams and the river. We then shuttle the water to where the incident is.

Driving throughout the community, many of our lanes are privately owned. If you could be kind to us, we would appreciate if the residents on these lanes could maintain the brush and trees. Please try to keep the private lanes at least 12 feet wide and 12 feet of height. This will allow fire apparatus to pass through, if necessary, without causing damage to the vehicles.



During the fall season prepare your property for the winter months. Clear brush and debris from your rain gutters and around your residence. If you plan on burning this debris, do so in a container and on a non-windy day. Have someone there with a source of water if something were to happen. On the day you are doing

a **controlled burn** of your brush, **call Dauphin County** at **717-558-6900**. This is the **non-emergency** number. **Inform** them of the **location** and **duration** of the burn. If you have **questions** as to what can be burned, **call the Township** office and ask about the burn ordinance or go to the **Township web site** and search burn ordinance.

Your in-house preparations should include preparing for electric outages. Have your generator serviced prior to the winter, test it to be sure of proper operation. When was the last time you tested your home smoke and carbon monoxide detectors? They should be tested monthly. If you have battery operated detectors, replace the batteries every 6 months. Plan your escape route during a fire or incident. Have a family meeting place. Practicing fire safety in your home is a time for putting peace of mind in your family. SEE IT? REPORT IT!


The **spotted lanternfly** is an **invasive insect** from Asia currently found in southeastern Pennsylvania, and sightings have been reported in some neighboring states. The **spotted lanternfly** poses a **significant threat** to Pennsylvania agricultural commodities including the **grape**, **tree fruit**, **hardwood**, **landscape and nursery industries**, which are collectively worth nearly **\$18 billion** to the state's economy.

To slow or stop the spread, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture imposed a quarantine requiring the inspection of all items moving within or out of the area to prevent the transport of any living life stage of the pest. Businesses and organizations conducting business in the quarantine zone <u>must</u> have permits from PDA to move vehicles, equipment and goods within and out of the zone.

Dauphin County is in the quarantine area and the spotted lanternfly has been seen in Middle Paxton Township.

This plant hopper weakens plants by feeding on sap. It excretes a sticky, sugary substance called honeydew, which attracts stinging insects, promotes the growth of sooty mold, and causes a messy nuisance for residents.

KNOW what to look for:



REPORT spotted lanternfly sightings at **extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly**.

STOP the spread of this invasive insect by **DESTROYING** all life stages that you find. Check your car and other outdoor equipment before traveling.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

The **Township** has a contract with **Waste Management of Pennsylvania** for weekly pick up and disposal of residential waste and pick up of recyclable materials throughout the Township. Residents are **billed directly** by Waste Management on a **quarterly basis** for this service. **All Township residents are required to have an account with Waste Management.**

Standard Service

\$25.59 per month (Sept. 2019 - Sept. 2020)

Standard Service includes **2 large**, **30-33 gallon trash bags**, **unlimited recycling** and **one bulk** item pick up **per week**. Bags should be able to be picked up by one individual without tearing. No substituting a large bag for one bulk item. **Extra tags** can be purchased at the **Township office** for **\$5.30 per tag** (cash or check) for excess bags over the allowable two bags .

Tag-A-Bag Customers Bulk Item pick up **\$ 5.30 per tag** (30-33 gallon trash bag) **\$35.00 per item** (must call ahead to WM)

Recycle Bins

18 gal - \$15.00 33 gal - \$18.00

New residents moving into the area and **purchasing an existing home** must pay for new recycle bins. (Previous resident should have left bin behind.) Residents who **build a new home** in the Township will receive a **free recycle bin**.

Waste Management will NOT take any items that have Freon in them or that were manufactured to use Freon. Residents may call Dauphin County Recycling Center at (717) 982-6772 for information on what they accept and any applicable fees. Waste Management will not take any type of electronics (TVs, computers, copiers, printers, etc.) These items may be taken to the Dauphin County Recycling Center free of charge for Dauphin County Residents. Waste Management does not accept leaves and weeds. The ideal solution is a home compost pile.

The Township strongly encourages our residents to recycle. The following materials may be recycled and placed curbside on your weekly trash day:



- Aluminum cans food & beverage consisting of aluminum, excluding aluminum foil, trays, and plates.
- Bimetal cans food & beverage containers consisting of a steel cylinder and an aluminum top and bottom
- ◆ Glass bottles, jars or other containers made of clear, colored glass. This includes all food and beverage containers made of glass. Excluded are light bulbs and window or plate glass.
- Newsprint Paper having printed news or other matter of public interest.
- Magazines glossy publications, advertisements and inset of newspapers.
- ◆ High Grade Office Paper bond, copier, letterhead, or mimeograph paper.
- ◆ Plastics food, beverage & detergent containers comprised of the following resins: #1, #2, and #5 only.
- Steel Cans food & beverage containers consisting of steel.
- Corrugated Paper cardboard boxes & packaging.
- Paperboard containers of dry food such as cereal.

Trash Collection - Trash collection is one day per week. The current scheduled collection day is Wednesday. Under the Borough contract with Waste Management, the trucks may arrive as early as **5 A.M.** Please have your trash along the curb by this time. If your trash is not picked up because it was not put out on time, Dauphin Borough will not pick up your trash. You will be responsible for your trash until the next scheduled pick up day. One (I) bulk item is permitted each week. Bulk items include: tables, chairs, sofas, mattresses, box spring, appliances (washer, dryer, dishwasher, etc.), and similar items provided two people can lift the item into the back of the truck. Non-acceptable items include: batteries, propane tanks, household hazardous waste, loose piles, tree stumps, yard debris, construction demo, herbicides/ insecticides, electronics, and items containing Freon.

Dauphin Borough has purchased new playground equipment for the Dauphin Community Park (old school playground). This equipment is being purchased through a Gaming Grant obtained from the Community Development Block Grant Program. The playground equipment will be installed in early spring of 2020.

The **Borough** purchased a **street sweeper** which will allow the **Borough** to sweep our streets throughout the year. **No parking signs** will be posted on your street a day **in advance** of the sweeping. Please **remove** your vehicle to allow the workers to **clean** your street.

Dauphin County Commissioners appoint cross-section of residents to a steering committee determining the future of Detweiler Park

MIDDLE PAXTON TOWNSHIP (May 15, 2019) – What does a high school student, township manager, hunter, forester, tourism expert and a business owner have in common?

They are all part of the 16-member **Detweiler Park Master Site Plan Steering Committee** appointed by the **Dauphin County Commissioners** today to help decide the best **recreational improvements** for the **400-acre park** over at least the next decade.

The Commissioners introduced the committee at an evening picnic in one of Detweiler's wooded groves and stressed they are looking for continued public input throughout the **12- to 18-month planning process**.

"We received interest from more than 70 residents asking to serve on the committee, and it wasn't easy making the final selection," said board **Chairman Jeff Haste**. "I want to thank the 16 members for agreeing to serve, and I hope those who were not selected will remain involved as we move forward."

Since **Detweiler Park** in **Middle Paxton Township** opened in the summer of 2017, more than **600 visitors** have provided feedback, with suggestions ranging from keeping it natural and adding more hiking trails and restrooms to a fenced-in dog park and trails for bicycles. There have also been **requests** to allow hunting, which will be considered along with other potential activities.

"Detweiler is a true gem and we want to make sure what we do now can be appreciated and enjoyed by our children and their children," said Commissioner Mike Pries. "The process we're starting is really creating an owner's manual for the park that will decide how we phase in the improvements people want to see."

"We've said from the start that this is the 'people's park' and we welcome all ideas," said **Commissioner George P. Hartwick, III.** "This truly is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity."

The steering committee's first job will be working with county officials to select a consultant to help gather public input, analyze the park's features and draft the master plan. At least three public meetings are planned, with the first likely occurring in the fall to present a report about the park and seek further public input. The next meeting would go over a draft of the master plan with a third held to review the final draft before it is submitted for Commissioners' approval.

The **county** received a \$75,000 **grant** from the state **Department of Conservation and Natural Resources** for the planning process, which the **Commissioners matched** with a \$75,000 **gaming grant**.

Detweiler Park already features seven miles of walking trails through various habitats and a fish hatchery maintained by the **Dauphin County Anglers** and **Conservation Club on Clark's Creek**, which borders the park's western edge. Additionally, there are two fields, each approximately 75 acres, that some have suggested could be used for festivals and events.

About **1,500 visitors** a month have come to **Detweiler Park** since its grand opening in June 2017, or about 50 guests per day.

The park was made possible in part by a **generous donation** from the **Detweiler Family**, who once operated the Harrisburg Telegraph, WHP and Stackpole Books. Members of the family lived on the property for almost a century and wanted to see it preserved. *Continued on next page...*

Last year, the commissioners unveiled a unique "Adopt-A-Chair" fundraising campaign to help maintain and care for the park that features beautiful Adirondack chairs, handcrafted by E&S Vinyl in Millersburg. Each \$200 chair features a personalized plaque of the donor's choosing and will provide beautiful seating areas at the park for years to come.



PICKLEBALL COMING TO HAGY PARK

A recent NBC today show episode claims pickleball may be "The fastest growing sport you've never heard of."

According to Amanda Loudin of NBC News "**Pickleball** has had a 650 percent increase in numbers over the last six years. The biggest subset of that growth is not in the over-60 crowd, says Justin Maloof, executive director of USAPA, but the younger set. "When the sport first caught on in the Sunbelt states around 2009, it was at 55-plus centers and RV communities," he says. "It snowballed from there. News from the Clarks Creek Watershed Preservation Association

Volunteers from the Clarks Creek Watershed Preservation Association gathered on Saturday morning, May 4, 2019, for its 17th Adopt-a-Highway trash pickup effort, scouring both sides of two miles of Route 325 Clarks Valley Road, in Dauphin, PA. Led by CCWPA President Paula Zankel and CCWPA Secretary Mike Blum, the workers in two groups carefully walked down the road, filling over a dozen large trash bags with debris, trash, garbage, car parts, tobacco products and more. The effort was once again under the auspices of the Great American Cleanup of Pennsylvania.

"It's been a real privilege to do this now seventeen times, beginning in 2011," says Zankel. "We have noticed that, as the years have gone by and our efforts have continued, the **road seems much cleaner**. We hope that this means that our efforts have convinced the public that littering is wrong, that the environment needs to be protected, and that trash belongs in the proper receptacles, not tossed out a car window!" she adds.

Significant items removed on May 4 included 478 cigarette butts; 83 food wrapper trash items; 52 beverage cans (mostly beer cans); 49 plastic beverage bottles; and 48 tobacco packaging items (mostly Copenhagen brand tobacco cans). "There's always a few unique things," Zankel states. "This time, we found a pair of long johns — you don't see those often! — and a pair of women's rubber wading boots!"

The **CCWPA** estimates it has removed well over two tons of trash, garbage and debris from Clarks Valley Road as part of this program.

The CCWPA's **2nd** "Clarks Creek Walk" took place on a beautiful, warm Sunday, June 9, 2019, from 3 - 5 pm. 28 members of the CCWPA and the general public walked about a mile and a half of the creek banks, inspecting riparian buffering, the effects of recent flooding and creek diversion, creek-side wildflowers and other flora, and more.

Botanist Rachel Goad, M.S., a staff biologist for the Western PA Conservancy, led the walk, discussing native growth, invasive species, and general creek-side flora.

"We thank Ms. Goad," says Blum, "for her dedication and absolutely voluminous knowledge, and her willingness to share it with the group. She answered every question and knew the growth stage, name and impact of every growing thing along the banks," Blum adds. "It was totally impressive!"

The **2019 Annual Meeting** of the Association is **scheduled** for Thursday, **September 26, 2019**, in the Dauphin County Agricultural & Natural Resources Center, 1451 Peters Mountain Road, Dauphin, PA 17018. The CCWPA Annual Meeting will have a social half-hour at 6:30 pm, and commence at 7 pm. The **public is invited**; the meeting is free of charge. The work of the Association over the past year will be reviewed, and reports on water quality, emergency notifications, local changes and more matters of interest are planned.

The **18th CCWPA Adopt-a-Highway** volunteer trash-pickup session is scheduled for **Saturday**, **October 19, 2019**, from 9 am to noon along a 2-mile stretch of Rte. 325, Clarks Valley Road. Everyone interested in helping to keep 100s of cigarette butts, plastic trash, food trash, bottles and cans and all matter of debris **OUT** of the watershed, out of the creek, the Susquehanna River, the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, is welcome to join members of the Association in this effort. Children are welcome, too, so long as their parents are present. Volunteers meet at Flemish Down, 1231 Clarks Valley Road, for instructions and supplies. There is a **free pizza party** afterwards for everyone who helped.



The Cost of Maintaining and Paving Roads

This summer work was completed on **Blue Mountain Parkway** that included pipe replacement, paving and stone shoulders, line painting and reflectors. The **cost** of this road project was **approximately \$350,000** not including wages and wear and tear on equipment. Each year the Township receives **Liquid Fuels** funds to help with road improvements. The **Municipal Liquid Fuels Program** funds a range of projects to support construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair of public roads or streets. The amount of a municipality's allocation is based on its population and miles of roads on their approved Liquid Fuels Inventory. The amount of **Liquid Fuels** allocation received this year was **\$221,142.00**; this amount is far less than what the costs were to do all the road improvements necessary on **Blue Mountain Parkway**.

The **chip and fog seal process** will be performed **yearly** on designated roads in the Township. This is a **cost effective** way of keeping our roadways in good condition **without** the **high cost** of repaving. This will allow the Township to set aside a portion of the **Liquid Fuels** allocation for **future paving** of roads. Your **patience** and **understanding** is much **appreciated!** Leaving unkind voice messages or confronting municipal employees isn't the answer! **Slow down** and **drive sensibly** until the **chip and fog seal process** is completed!

Please also keep in mind that **Middle Paxton Township** is one of two municipalities in **Dauphin County** that <u>does not</u> collect a real estate tax. To help offset costs on projects, Municipal staff assists in grant writing to obtain grants for many projects throughout the Township including road improvements. Most grants are very competitive and take many hours to write and not always successful in obtaining. We thank you for your continued and anticipated support each year with our road improvement projects!
